- The best over-all description of the Washington-Franklin issues is Larry Weiss' *The Washington-Franklin Heads: Simplified!*
- Martin A. Armstrong's *United States Coil Issues 1906-38* covers the history and characteristics of all the Washington-Franklin coil stamps; and his *Washington Franklins 1908-21* separates the Washington-Franklins into nine groups, or series, and covers their history and characteristics.
- The classic text on these stamps is Max Johl's *United States Postage Stamps* 1902-1935.
- Larry Weiss' "Designing and Engraving the Washington-Franklin Series" presents the history of the conception and design, artwork, engraving, symbolism, and controversy over the choice of subjects.
- The Micarelli Identification Guide to U.S. Stamps groups the Washington-Franklins by denomination and provides concise charts and procedures for the identification of the many varieties.
- Paul W. Schmid's *The Expert's Book* provides detailed coverage of the Washington Franklins most commonly faked, identifies the issue(s) that can be altered to fake them and procedures for detecting the fake.
