Thursday the 16th., I had the pleasure of meeting Mr Vestal of Indianapolis at the S.P.A.Club meeting in "Cinci".

He sure has a fine lot of Doubles on the Department proofs and stamps. Nothing ever gets by that eagle eye. With a good glass he found a TRIPLE on one of my 30¢-1922 shifts (the usual shift at the left but there are three lines instead of two).

Be sure and look yours over carefully.

Meet Mr Perry Hobbs of 598 Sheridan Square, Evansten, Ill. Mr Hobbs is the 19th Shift Hunter "and how". Here is a beautiful "TWISTED" shift on one of the Newspaper stamps, the best one on any newspaper stamp that I have seen(I've only seen about 20). Perry should be proud of it.

Here is one of the favorites
of Major Bonesteel of Washington,
and you can't blame him for thinking
thus. Its on the 24g-Airmail, 1923
#1305. You do not need a glass to see it.
Plate number14841, in one of the upper panes.

Look up your S.H.Letter of 9-23-29.

and then get acquainted with Mr. E. Jost,
Box 340, Cincinnati, Ohio. Mr Jost is
S.H.#18 and has the following to say to
the others who are "in the same ward".
102-Spl.Del., Postman & Motercycle reported by
Mr Vestal. Find a block of 9 from the lower
right corner of the lower right pane of PLATE 17638 and you will
have 8 of these small shifts, some of them with the left frame line
clearly double. Mr McAlpin also finds a small and similar shift
with plate No. 17640 attached to the bottem of the stamp.

Here is a very clear shift on the 5¢-Parcel Post. Can't find any indication of this shift except at the lower right "5", but it sure is there. Three are at least two others.

McAlpin wants you to turn to the First
S.H.Letter and correct one of my
errors. The shift given as 51-LR12418 should be 46-LR-12418. Thanks
"Mac", very much. Now who will
find the upper right pane of this
plate and the lower rows of the upper left pane. Then the Hunters
will have this plate complete. Mac's full title is
Frederic R. McAlpin, 627 Comer Bldg., Birm;
ingham, Ala., and he is S.H. No.17. He is
Optometrist for the B.& S. Optical Co.

One of out Hunters finds extra lines in "FI" of "FIVE" on the 5c Forn. Exchange Civil war Revenue as shown on the previous page. Is this a shift? Is it found on all copies? Here is one that I was once fooled on. The 6c-Dpt.of the Interior. The upper lable is nicely doubled clear across the stamp. I that it was a shift but soon found that "they are all like that". Two others have been "caught" the same way. Let me know about your copies of the 5c-Forn. Exchange.

Mr Oliver Wolcott, 890 Stadleman Ave., Akron, Ohio collects shifts on cover and he sure "has them". He is President of the Rubber City Stamp Club and is S.H. No.16.

Mr W.F.Goerner, famous for 36-1851's lives at 7 Birchfield Read, Edgewood, R.I. "W.F." just can't stick to the 1851 shifts when there are so many fleating around on 20th Century U.S. we welcome him as Hunter No.14.
