A New Test Stamp: Safeguard STAMPAFIX

Recently, I was lucky to acquire an unusual stamp affixer. Inside was a roll of previously unknown test stamps which had presumably been in the machine for 100+ years. Just for fun, as AI is everywhere, I asked Copilot to write this article. To my surprise, it produced several pages. Here's its introduction:

"Unveiling the Discovery — The stamp was uncovered during a routine cataloging of historical artifacts in a small archive facility, nestled in a quiet town. It was initially overlooked due to its unassuming design, but upon closer examination, researchers realized its immense significance. A handwritten note accompanying the stamp indicated that it originated from a country no longer recognized — a nation once thriving but lost to the sands of time."

Sounds like a script for a movie but, of course, this and all other paragraphs were complete nonsense, so back to the old-fashioned way.

The stamps are endways delivery with the name of the product, name of the company, and an image of the machine printed in purple. There are 11 loose stamps, all mis-cut, suggesting the affixer may not have been that great, and a partial roll of 98 stamps with the last two gummed to a cardboard core. There is a splice that occurred at the 74th stamp. The stamps are perforated 8½ horizontally.

The machine is a SAFEGUARD, STAMPAFIX made by the Stampafix Company of Boston, Mass. It's a 6" cast iron cube with beveled glass windows. Not surprisingly, at 20 pounds it is quite heavy. It was offered on eBay together with what appears to be a custom carrying case, two stock certificates, a US patent, a key, and various tools. The starting bid was \$0.99 but it attracted significant interest.

According to Massachusetts records, the company was incorporated on 29 Nov 1910 and dissolved sometime in 1914. An application for a patent was filed on 25 Feb 1911 and granted 12 Oct 1915 (after the company had been dissolved).

I can find no contemporary adverts or any other material showing it went into production. The paint on the handle is well worn suggesting considerable use. Given the carrying case, my guess is that this is the inventor's demonstration unit. At the time, he would have been up against several lighter handheld designs and a few similar desktop designs.

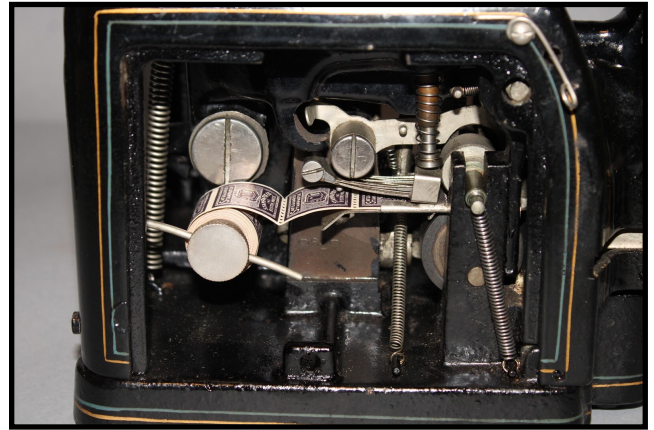

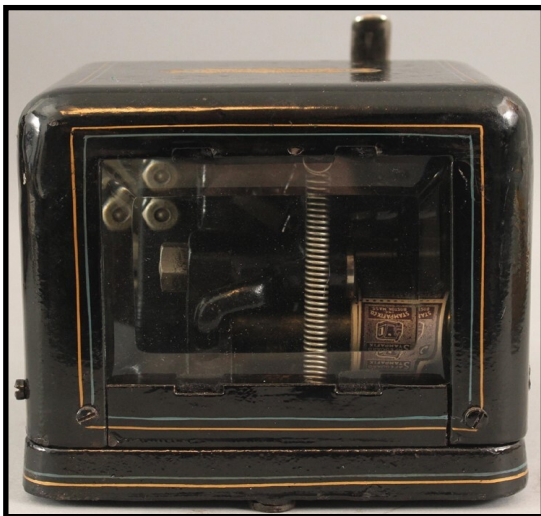

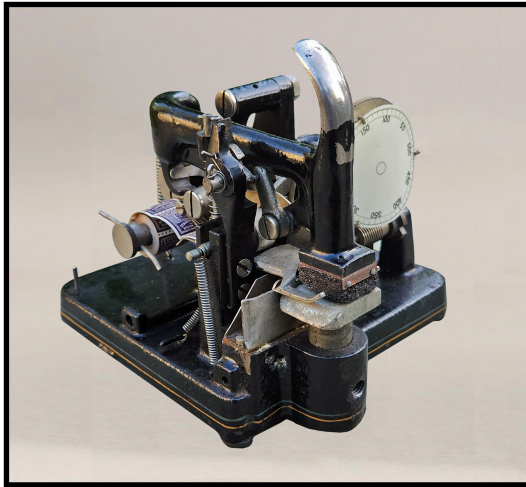

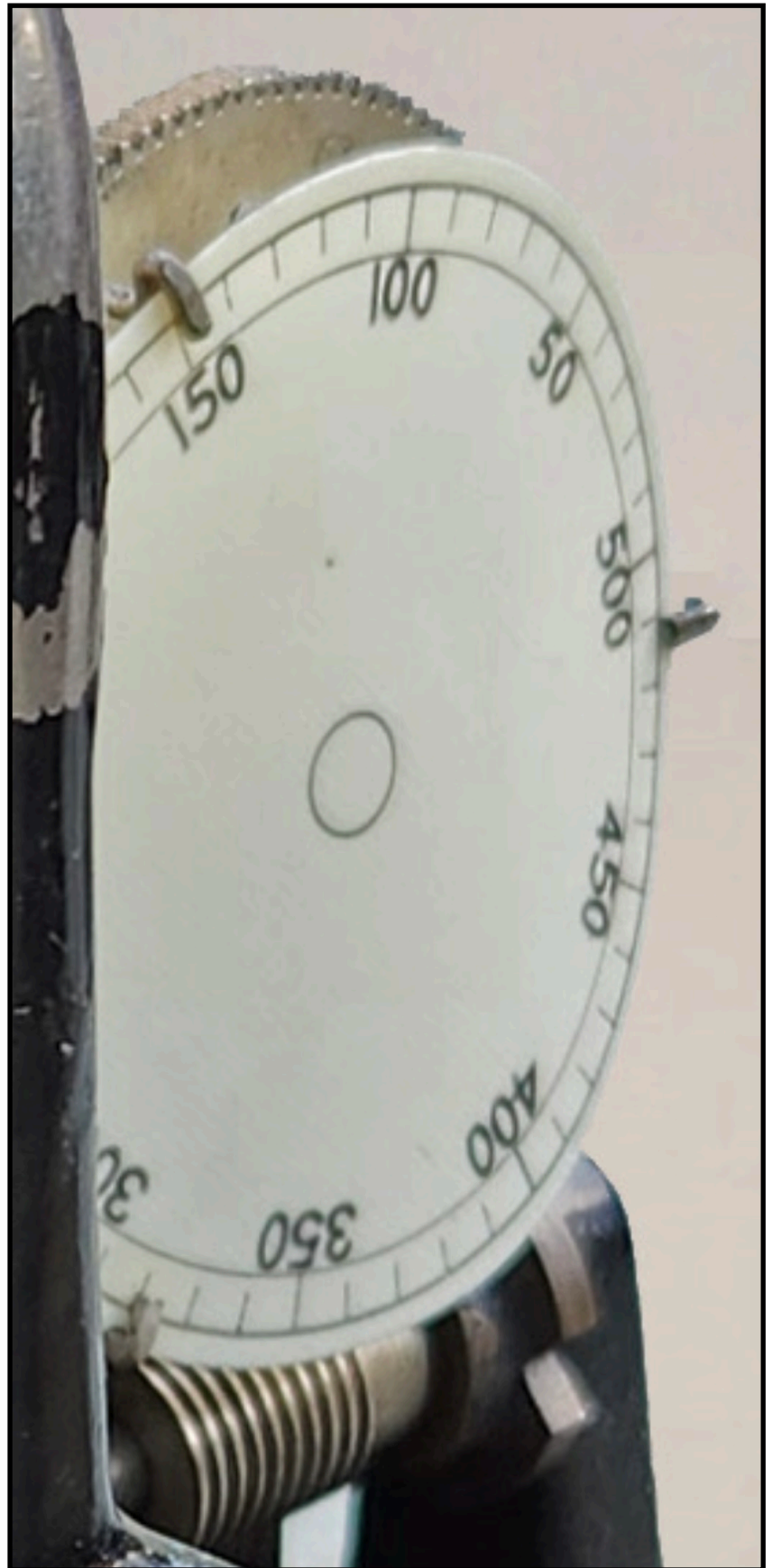
An enlargement of the SAFEGUARD, STAMPAFIX stamp affixer decal.

The enlarged image of the round counter shown at the right, shows the operator of the stamp affixer how many stamps remain on the coil roll. There is a small round window on the front of the stamp affixer (see the image of the front at the top left of Page 2) that allows the user to see approximately how many stamps are left.

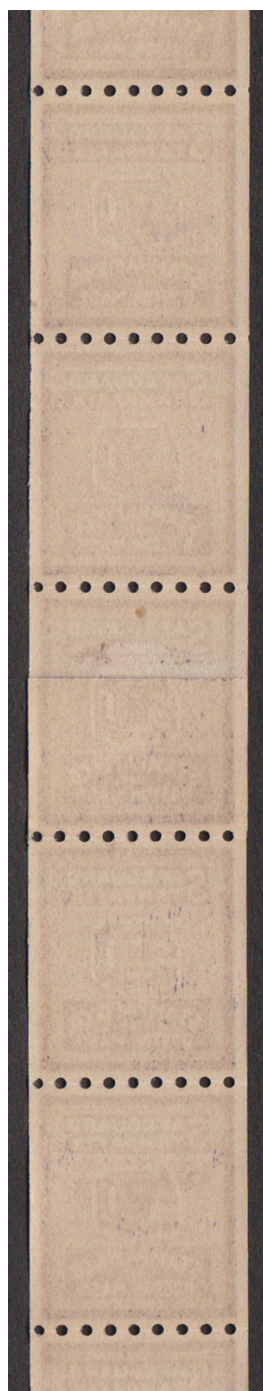
Shown above is the October 12, 1915 patent certificate Number 1,256,308 for the stamp affixing machine made by inventor Lionel G. H. Palmer (of Roslindale, Massachusetts).

This document gave the Stampafix Company, its successors and assigns the exclusive right to make, use and sell Lionel Palmer's stamp affixer in the USA for 17 years. Lionel Palmer applied for his patent on February 25, 1911, but he assigned his rights to the Stampafix Company before the patent was granted on October 12, 1915. Note that the decal on top of the affixer shown in the photo on Page 2 says "PATENT APPLIED FOR" and also shows the Stampafix Company made this affixer.

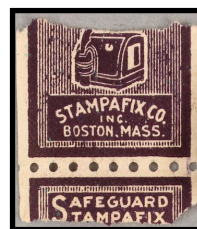

About the Author - I'm an ex-Brit living in the US. I collect British stamps, mostly booklets and rolls, so why did I buy a US stamp affixer? Several years ago, while looking through a couple of UK dummy stamp collections, I noticed some with odd perforation. Turns out they were American. There was also an article in a reputable journal that stated Multipost was British. Given the trade between the two countries, it should be expected that affixers (especially handhelds) and their test stamps can be found on both sides of the pond.

There did not seem to be a useful source that partitioned US and UK machines and stamps, so I did my homework and put up a website. Naturally, after a while, I started to collect affixers. There is a display of handheld affixers in my office, mostly Multipost and Postafix (from the 1960s) as they are easy to find — there are usually several on eBay. Other affixers are much more difficult, some are unique, some are only known from adverts, but I continue to look.

We want to thank Paul Ramsay for this wonderful article about not only a new test stamp discovery but for the in-depth details about the SAFEGUARD, STAMPAFIX machine made by the Stampafix Company of Boston, Massachusetts.

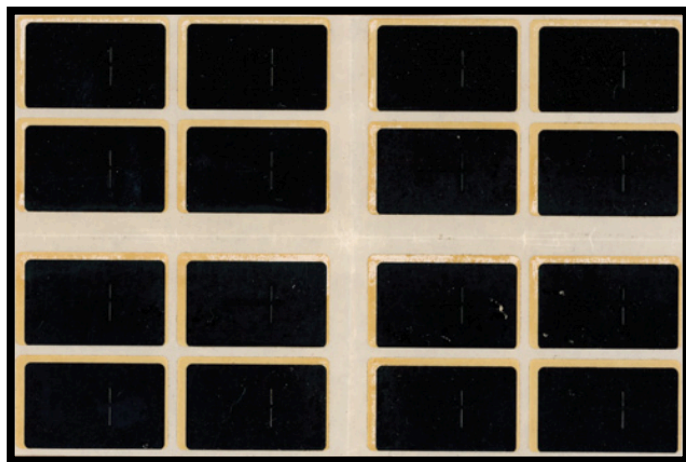

We have proposed to Scott Publishing that this new discovery be listed as TD27C TE17c in the next update of the Scott United States Specialized Catalogue.

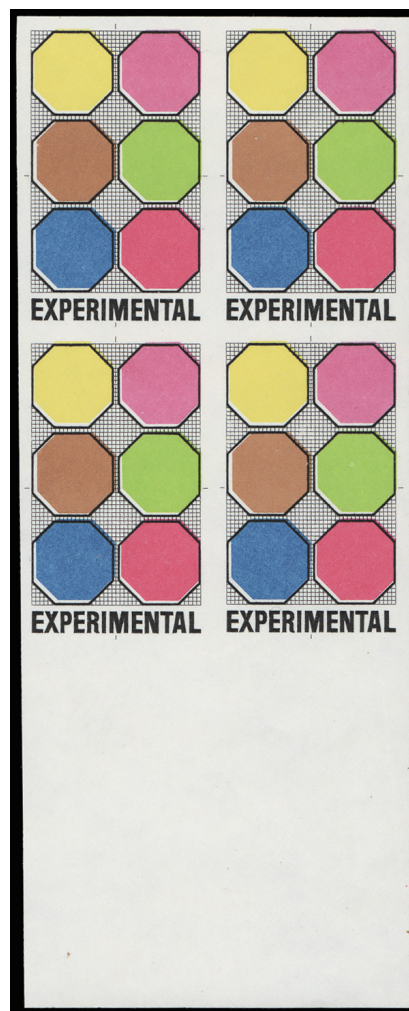



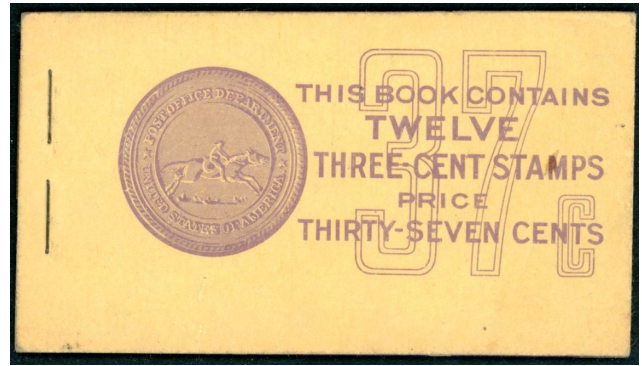

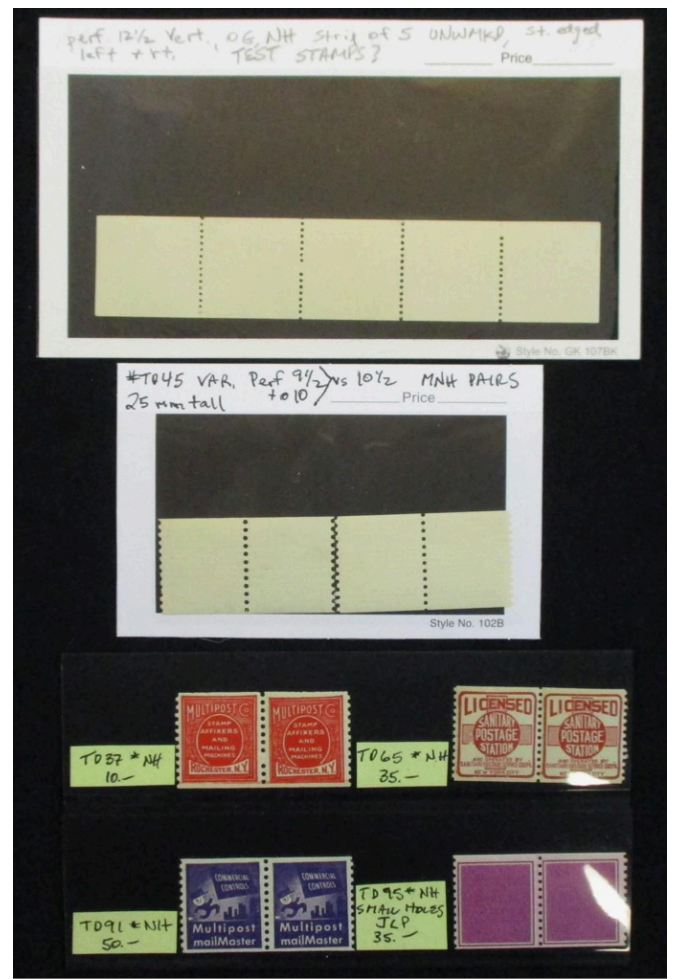

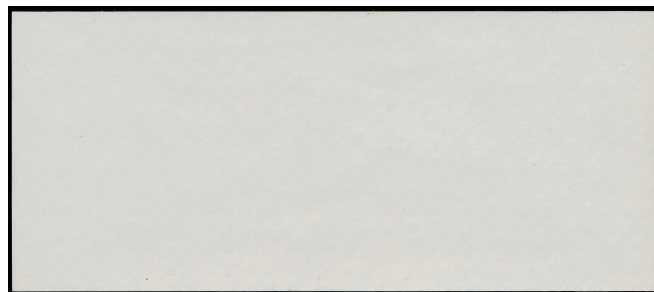

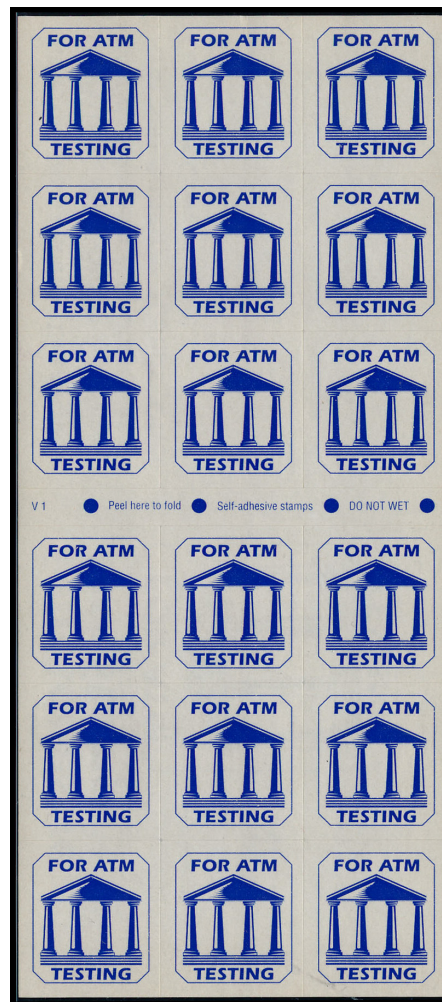

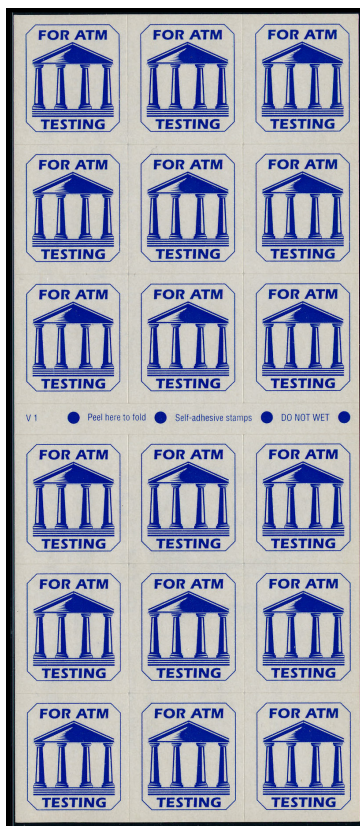

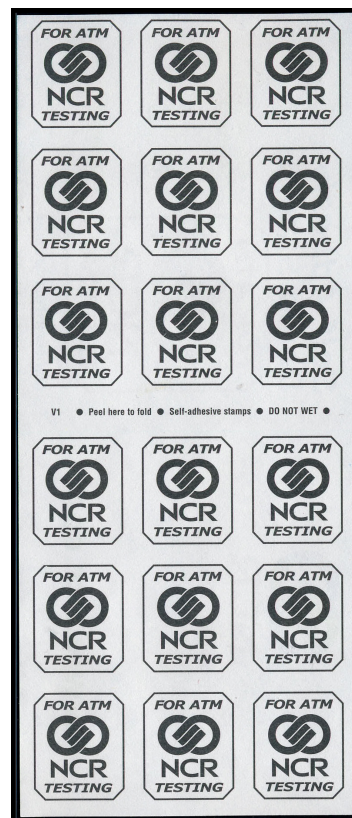

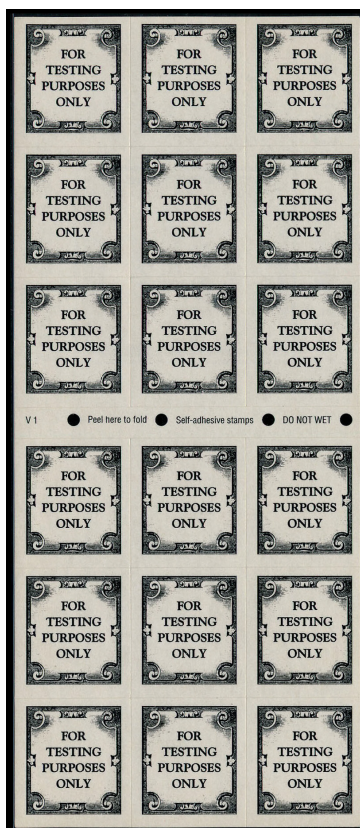

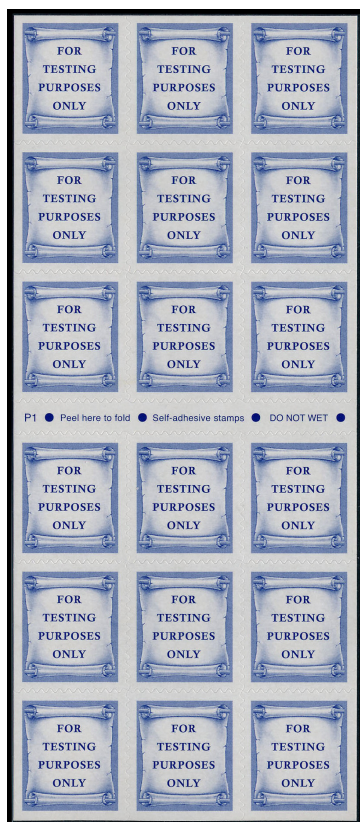

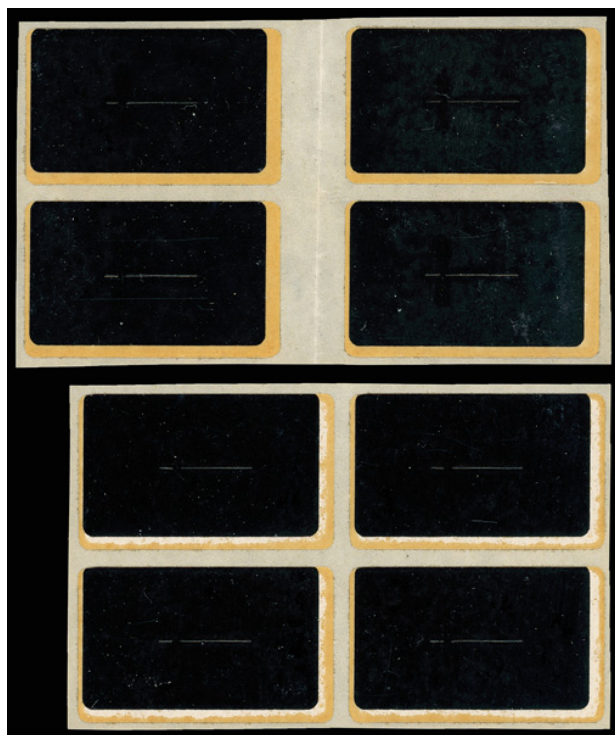

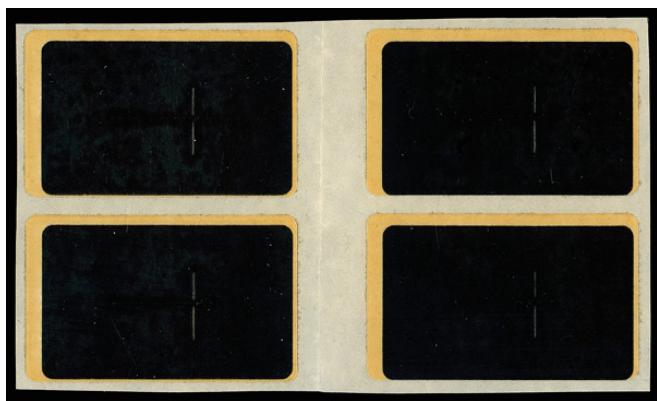

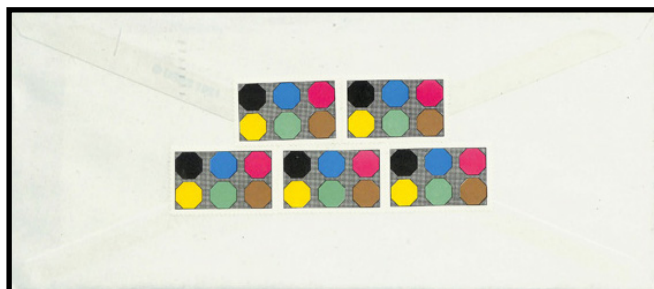

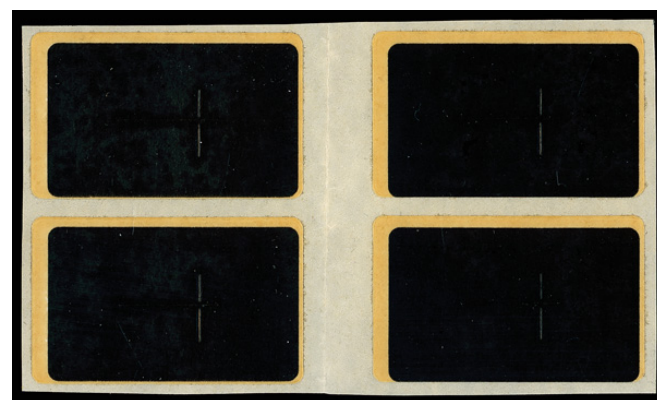

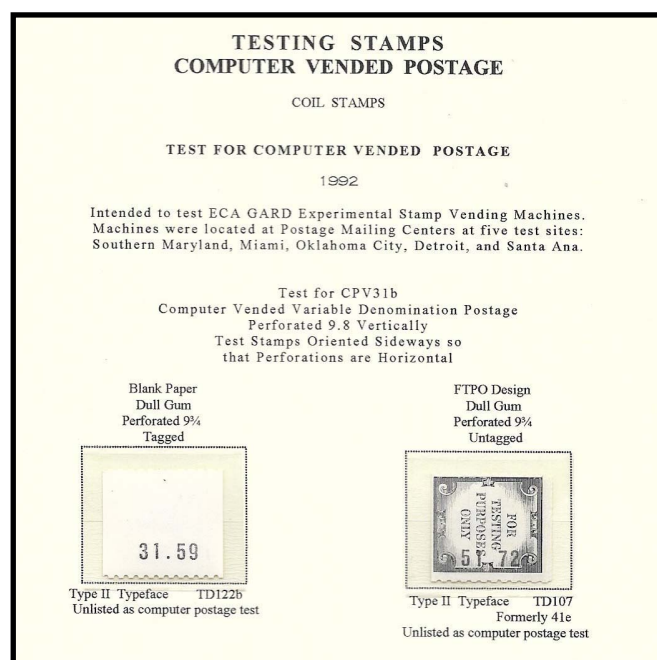
